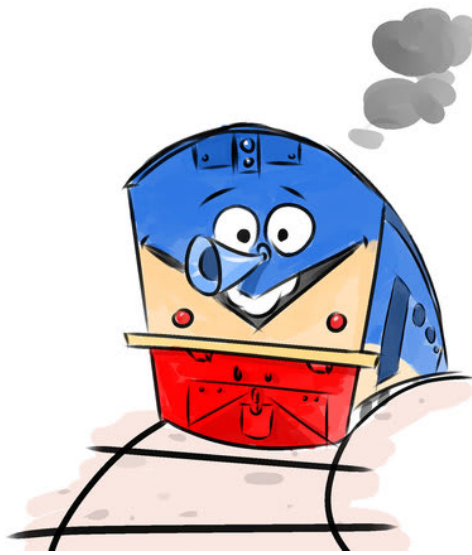

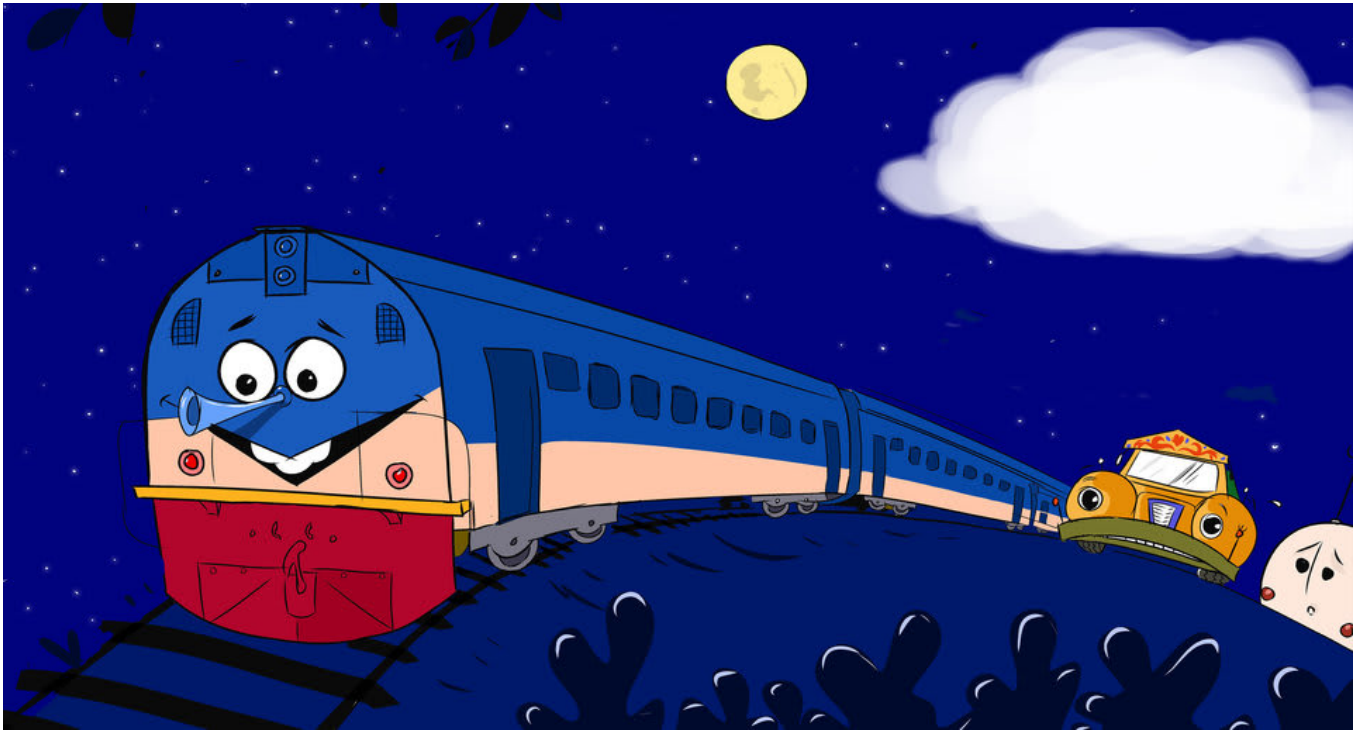
The Happy Train is a story about the journey of train that ventures far from home into a dark, scary forest and becomes frightened. How do you think the train will overcome her fears?

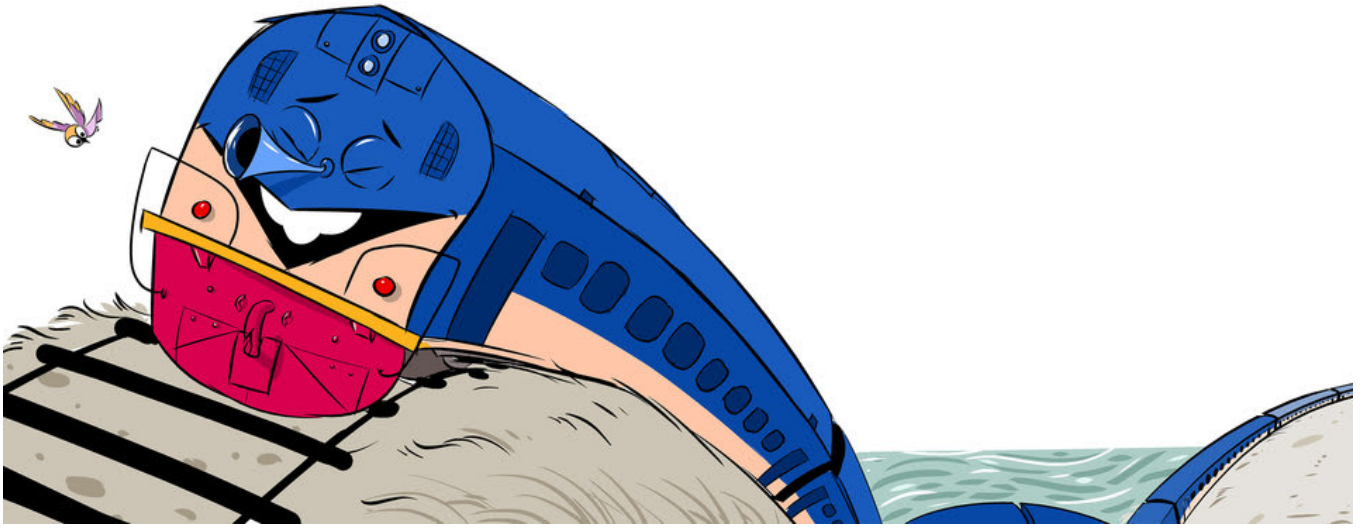

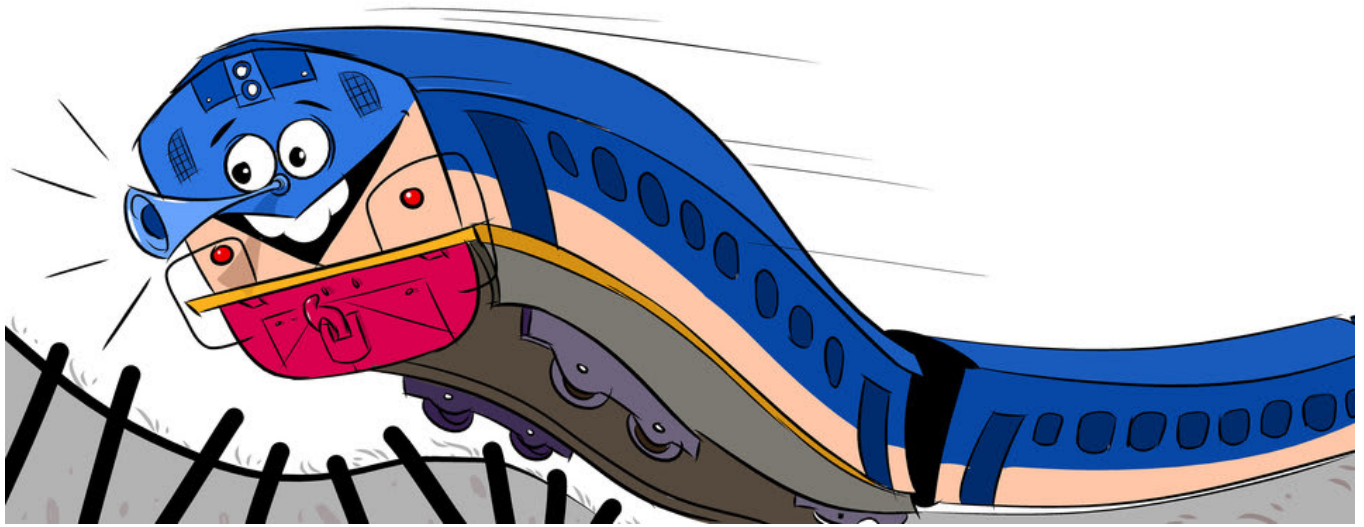
Choo Choo!

Soon she is passing fields and lakes, laughing as she goes.

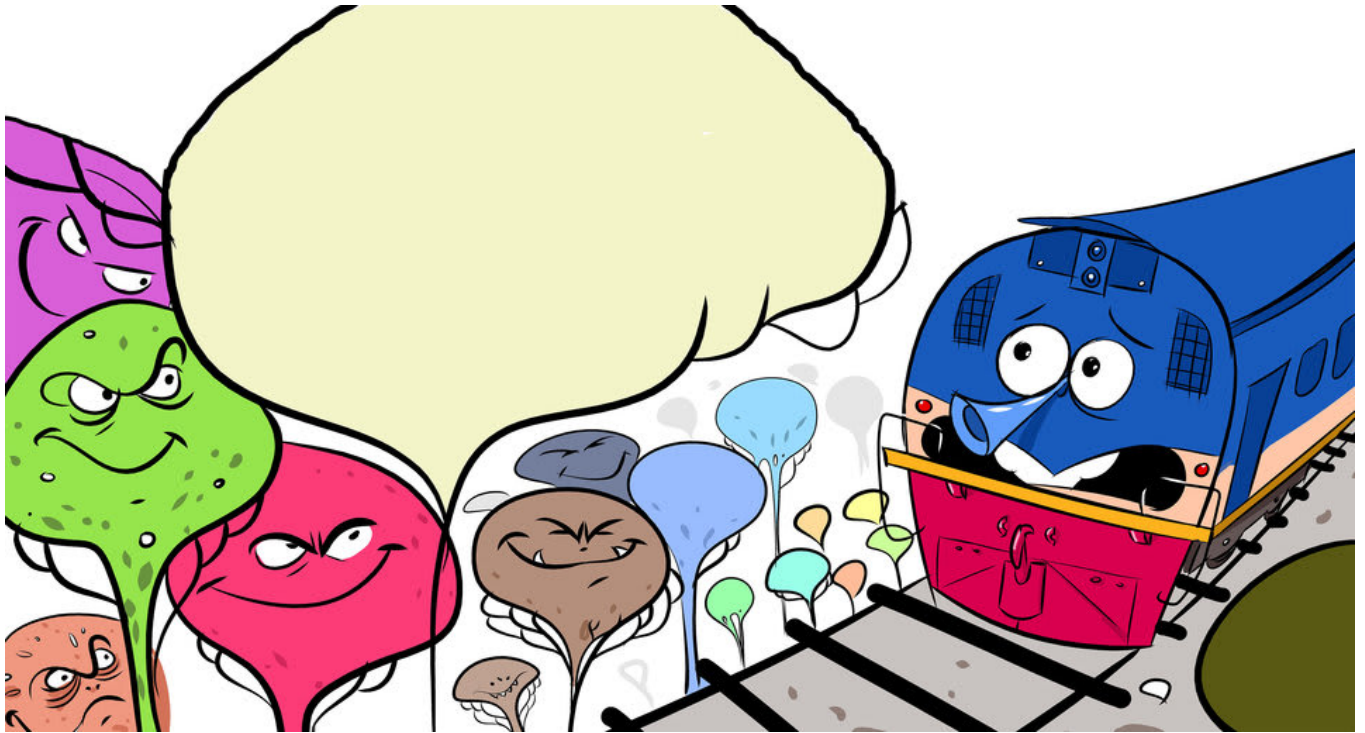


There's no stopping her! She chugs along through the next day, taking no rests.

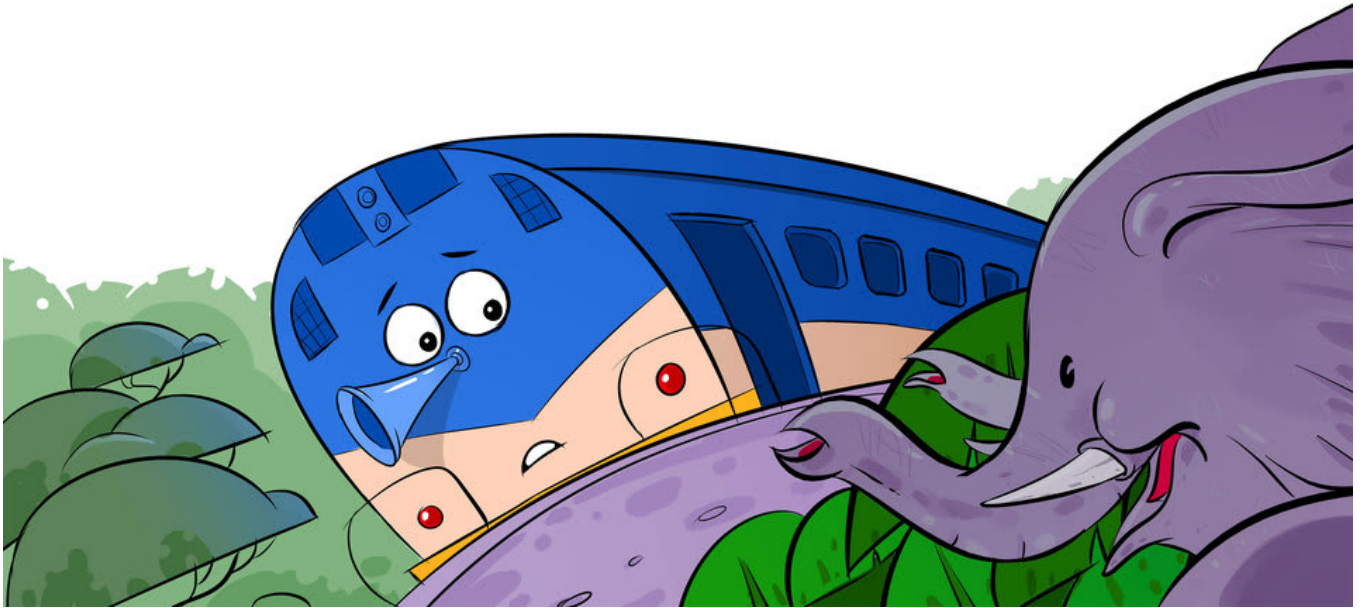
CLANK CLANK,

The smile fades from her face.

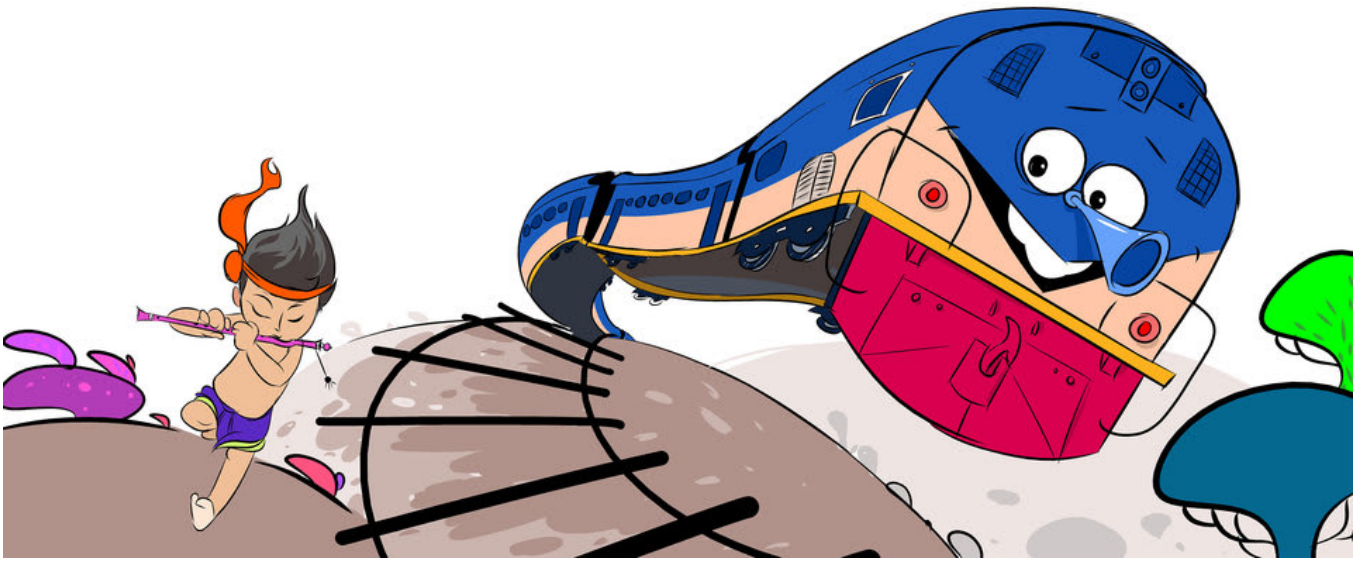


It's night again, and the train is farther than she's ever been before. She wants to rest for a while, but in this dense forest of elephants, she begins to fear for her life.

Out pops a little boy, smiling happily.





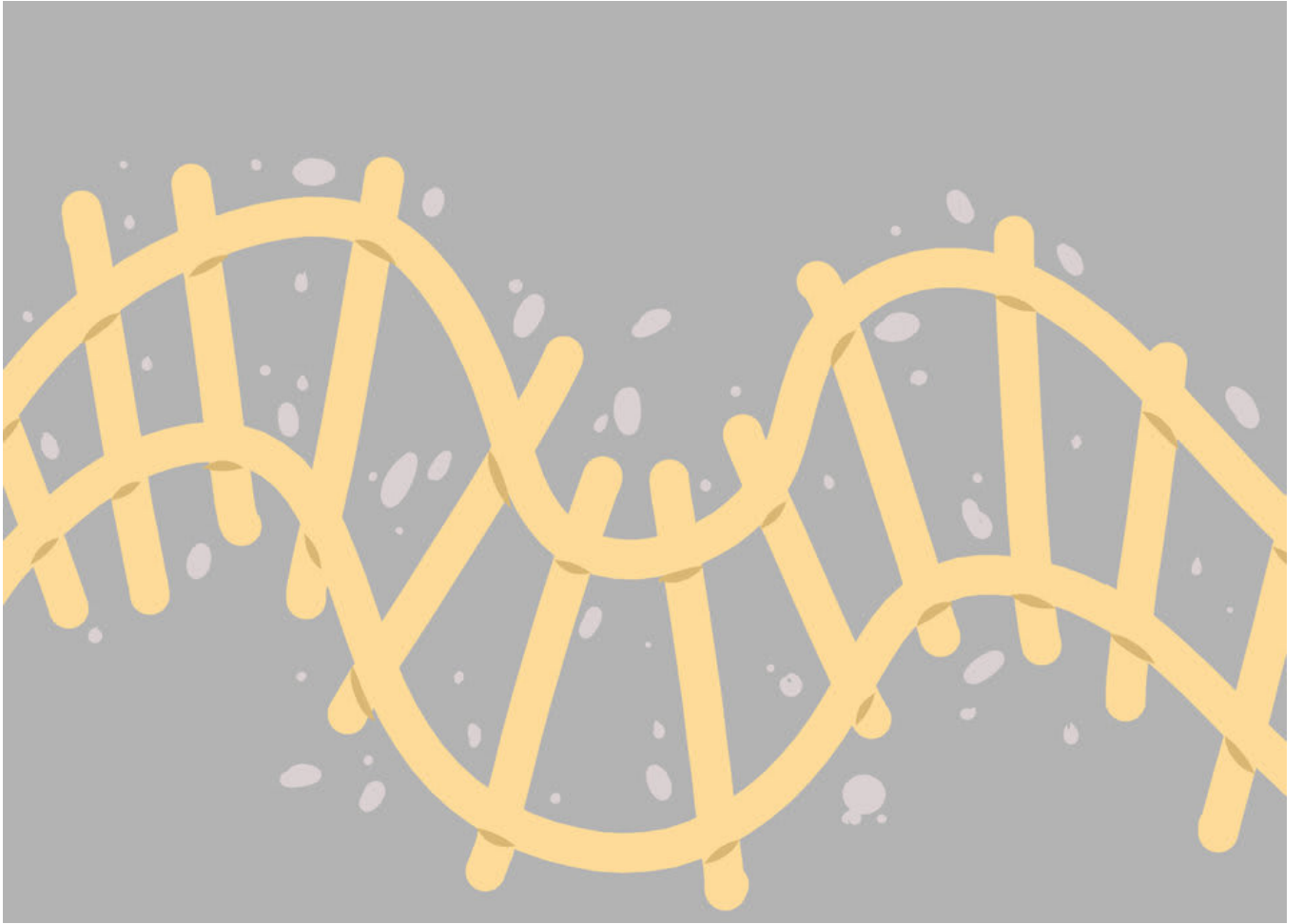
He holds a magic flute and begins to play.
