

The lion was the king of the jungle.


Everyone shivered and shook when he roared.

"Alright," agreed the lion.



The elephant, cheetah, bear and deer were all worried.


Who would stick their hand into the lion's mouth?




Two days passed. The toothache was getting unbearable.

"Alright," said the lion and opened his mouth wide.




