



## **Queens of Shakrain**








The sky on Shakrain is like nothing else in the whole wide world. It is busy with colorful paper ghuris fighting and dancing, gigantic dhaushes that dip and dive like hunting birds, and chongs that look like spaceships. On Shakrain, all the rooftops of Old Dhaka are open. This year, I will go up to the top. This year, I will no longer have to run the streets chasing fallen kites.



There are three rules to making a good kite. RULE NUMBER ONE: The left side of the kite should be exactly like the right side in every way. So in making my kite, I measure very carefully.




RULE NUMBER TWO: The kite should be as light as possible, so the wind can lift it into the air. So, in making my kite, I use the lightest wood and paper.




RULE NUMBER THREE: You must run fast. And cheer the kite on so that it goes higher and higher and higher!
