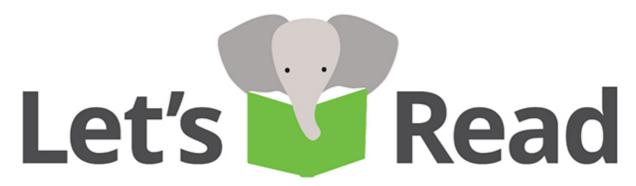


Protecting the Village


When Sonia, Siku, and Atoi find a weeping tree in the mountains, they learn that their village is in danger. How will they help save their home from heavy rain?









"Siku, we have to go before it gets dark!" Sonia shouted as she and Atoi headed to the mountains. They were going to chop down trees.


As they walked, Atoi heard a voice. He stopped and asked, "Who is crying?" Sonia and Siku listened carefully




"Boo-hoo-hoo. It really hurts," the voice sobbed.




Sonia looked around. She was stunned to see a bright casuarina tree crying big, sad tears.




