
## **Grasshopper Speaks Up**

Grasshopper enjoys playing with his friends, Cricket and Frog. One day, he learns they are both sick. What happened, and can Grasshopper help them get better?






Grasshopper Speaks Up Kong Sok Keng

But the next day, Grasshopper's friends are not in the meadow again. He looks everywhere for them, but they are nowhere to be found. Grasshopper decides to fly home alone.




On the way, he sees Cricket spraying chemicals on plants that are being grown for food. There are containers of empty chemicals floating in the river nearby.


